

INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Helminthologia publishes peer-reviewed original scientific articles, review articles and research notes on various aspects of pure and applied helminthology, particularly on helminth and endo-parasites in human and animal hosts and plant parasites of environmental, health and veterinary importance along with taxonomic contributions. Book reviews and Letters to the Editor offering comments on material published in this journal are also welcome.

General instructions

Submission of a manuscript implies that the work described has not been published before (except in the form of an abstract or as part of a published lecture, or thesis); that it is not under consideration for publication anywhere else; that its publication has been approved by all co-authors, if any, as well as by the responsible authorities - tacitly or explicitly - at the institute where the work has been carried out. The publisher will not be held legally responsible should there be any claims for compensation.

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However, the authors are strongly encouraged to use online submission system to facilitate even quicker and more efficient processing. Electronic submission substantially reduces the editorial processing and reviewing times and shortens overall publication times. Please note that manuscripts submitted in printed form will be returned for online submission.

Paper Writing Guide

Manuscripts, written in English, should be submitted in MS Word (97 or higher) either as standard DOCUMENT (.doc) or RICH TEXT FORMAT (.rtf). Use a normal plain font (e.g. Times New Roman) for text. The graphs can be submitted in MS Excel or MS Word (97 and higher) and figures in .jpg, .tif, .gif or common graphic formats.

Arrangement of the manuscript

Title page should comprise a concise but informative title (less than 40 characters), name of author(s) without titles, their affiliations and addresses and personal e-mail addresses.

Elements of the Manuscript

Please arrange the elements in this order:

- Summary
- Text
 - Introduction
 - Material and Methods
 - Results
 - Discussion (Results and Discussion may be combined in one section)
- Acknowledgements,
- References
- Tables, Figures, Illustrations, Legends

Summary must accompany every article. It should present the most important results and conclusions in not more than 150 words. Following the text of the abstract, 3 to 6 key words, separated by commas, should be listed for indexing.

Text – general rules

We appreciate any effort you make that the English is corrected before submission.

Genus and species names should be in italics. The common names of animals should not be capitalized. When describing a new species (and other new taxa) please provide an exact address where the specimens are deposited, including the collection numbers of holotypes, paratypes, etc. The rules governing biological nomenclature, as laid down by the International Code for Zoological Nomenclature should be followed.

Please try to restrict the use of abbreviation to the SI symbols and those recommended by the International Nomenclature. Abbreviations should be defined in brackets after their first use in the text. Standard SI units may be used without definition in the body of the paper.

Acknowledgement

Acknowledgements of people, grants, funds, etc should be listed in a separate section before the References.

References

All publications cited in the text should be presented in the list of references. The authors should provide complete, correct and properly structured references. If the article or book has DOI number, the authors are asked to include it in the references, which may allow automatic creation of active links, adding a greater value to a particular publication.

Titles of references should be given in English. Abbreviation of journal titles should follow the ISI Journal Title Abbreviations rules.

Tables

Each table should be numbered consecutively using Arabic numerals and referred to in the text by the number. Please provide a caption to each table, refer to a table in the text and The number of lines should be limited, using 2 horizontal lines separating headings of columns from the data properly plus 1 horizontal line below the Table. Vertical lines should be avoided.

Please, do not present the same data both in Tables and Figures. In general, Figures are preferable to Tables.

Figures

All photographs, graphs, illustrations and diagrams should be referred to as a "Figure" and should be numbered consecutively. Please insert keys and scale bars directly into figures. Relatively small text and great variation in text sized should be avoided. Provide a detailed legend (without abbreviations) to each figure and , refer to a figure in the text

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The legends should be listed in a separate file .

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
